On more serious notes:

Ronnie Salt (The Shot) on the **The Lying Game** conservatives use to disrupt politics.

An analysis of political and media failures, Michelle Grattan *House of Representatives Speaker's Lecture*: <u>Is the political system letting down the Australian Public</u>.

Continuing the theme of mis/dis-information, <u>Stephan Lewandowsky and John Cook prescribe an antidote</u> that we can apply.

Economic reform / transformation is closely linked to political transformation. The <u>New Economy Network Australia</u> (NENA) bring people and organisations working in this space together. They have great resources including recordings of webinars and conferences (in the Podcasts and Events sections). <u>Co-Canberra</u> is the local node in this network.

A Crisis in Democracy and Representation

This editorial, in our Resources Hub, explores the nature of the current 'crisis in democracy' and concludes that the crisis is "a crisis of a specific form of representation." Late 20th century evolution of western liberal politics with changes to political parties, and change in voters / citizens attitude to how the irresolvable tension between the need for representatives and the distrust of and need to keep representatives accountable has led to changes in citizen trust and behaviour which has been nominated as 'the crisis'.

It concludes "... the contemporary crisis of democracy has its origin in a failure of established forms of citizen's representation. However, their authors do not plead for a revival of direct democracy but - building on the

insights of the representative turn - instead examine a possibility of opening democracy's new dimensions that, while entrusting citizens with political power, avoid perils of populism and plebiscitarianism."
